Hand / Finger Prints

Mix up a dough and make hand or finger print prints as a keepsake ornament. Don't forget the pets here . . . a paw print for our four-legged friends works as well as a hand print for people. Be sure to keep the clay as thin as possible because you don't want your ornament to weigh too much. You can press into the clay or use a paint on the hand or paw.

For spring, we have "thumb bunnies." Basically, make a thumbprint and then add ears and tails if it's a behind view and ears and facial features if it's a fun view. Look, you're already working outside of the "Christmas" mind set. Check out Ed Emberley for some inspiration for other finger critters you can make.




Giving as gifts? Make a list!

Time to Craft!

Small craft projects are a great way to break up a boring day. You can use items from around your house, dig through your unused craft scraps or even take a trip to the local craft store for supplies. Ornaments are typically thought of as something to decorate a tree for Christmas. However, you can make them as yearround decorations. Display them in garland, an advent calendar, create a mobile or even decorate a tree. I'm stopping here because this zine is about making ornaments, not displaying them.

Our current "Christmas" tree is a lighted tree that looks like it has flowers on it . . . more of a sakura tree than a pine tree. The branches are very stark. We use it all year and put seasonal and other holiday ornaments on it throughout the year. Who says you have to have a pine tree for your main decoration?



My mom wanted to do a Disney-themed Christmas tree. Starting from scratch, she knew it would be very expensive. Instead, she collected all the Disney figurines our kids no longer played with and put eyehooks into the top of their heads. If a character was missing from the set, it didn't matter. And, you guessed it, instant ornaments. These are great because even when the dogs accidentally knock them on the floor, they're not going to break. Chewed up . . . well, that's another story.

So, go take a trip into the toybox. Anything that you can use? Any characters that you can put eye-hooks into will work. You might even get to hear a few stories when people see your ornaments.

TIP: After screwing in the eye-hook, take it back out. Put a drop of glue on it and put it back in. This will keep it together better than just the screw itself.

Design Your Own

Designing your own ornaments can be even more fun that following someone else's directions . . . even if they are simple.

Start by looking through the craft supplies and other items we've mentioned to create your own ornaments. If you don't have something, brainstorm items you do have that you can substitute.

As you create your own masterpiece, either note down the steps or take pictures as you go. This will give you something to reference if you decide you want to make more. Yes, you can skip this. However, I've found that I spend more time trying to recreate things than creating them in the first place.



Container for Filled Ball Ornaments

I've been discussing filling ball ornaments. However, you can substitute any jar or container with a lid that

or container with a lid that you can hang as a ball ornament. This might be old spice jars, baby food jars, purchased shapes from a craft store, bath supply containers or any other container.

So, it needs to be . . .

- Clear with all labels / adhesive removed
- Sealable, temporarily or permanently

Depending on the lid, you may want to cover it with ribbon, lace, fabric, paint or other material. Since there are so many possibilities, I'm not going to go into how to prepare the surface, glues to use, etc. You have the Internet. Use it!

- · Crafted miniature items
- Doily
- Dried flower petals
- Dried herbs
- Fabric piece
- Faux greenery
- Faux snow
- Feather(s)
- Fuse beads
- Graduation tassel
- Jingle bells (small)
- LEGOs shapes or loose pieces
- Memory notes
- · Miniature ornaments
- Moss
- · Office supplies
- · Old book pages
- Origami shape(s)
- Paper gift wrap, cellophane, strips, etc.
- Pebbles or small gravel
- Photos
- · Pinecones and branch (small)
- Pom-pom(s)
- Ribbon
- Rubber bracelets
- Sea glass
- Sequins
- · Sheet music

Filled Ball Ornaments

Filling a clear ball ornament with items is another simple ornament you can make. If the item you're adding is heavy, you may choose to use plastic instead of glass. The glass ornaments are very fragile. I've broken enough to know.

Be sure to clean your ball ornament before you start filling it. Residue from processing, packaging and shipping can make the ornament dull. If you choose a plastic ornament with two halves to put together, cover the seam with a cool ribbon.

To help you out, here's a short list of items that you might fill your ornament with.

- · Baby's breath
- · Beach scene
- · Beads and wire
- · Beads only
- Birch bark
- Buttons
- · Charm dangling in center
- Chenille stems
- · Christmas bows
- Confetti
- · Cotton balls

Decorated Ball Ornaments

So, we've looked at filling them, now let's look at decorating them. You can use paint, ink, glitter, melted crayon or just about anything on the inside to coat the inside of the ornament. This is great to color-match your theme.

You can also decorate the outside. Some things to consider include:

- Broken, reflective CD or DVD
- Decoupage image or photo
- · Paint creatures or scenes
- Randomly cover with paper
- Rub on letters / images
- Ribbon wrap
- · Rubber stamp
- Stencil
- Twine / string wrap
- Yarn wrap
- Zendoodle

Combined with a "fill", you can even add more variety. For example, adding painted fish to your beach scene inside gives your ball ornament even more character.



- Shells
- · Specialty knots
- · String, twine, etc.
- SWAPs
- Tinsel
- Vintage jewelry
- · Winter scene

NOTE: While items like popcorn may seem cool, remember the critters in your house that are looking for food when your ornaments are packed away.

Still Christmas?

I know you're thinking about your Christmas tree and following that theme. Stop. Right now.

Push yourself to think outside this use of ornaments.

A piece of driftwood featuring clear ornaments with sand and shells might be a unique decor item for your home. A thousand origami cranes in a mobile can do more than grant a wish. Keepsakes can be put into ornaments and then a bowl on your table as a way to share your family stories. Got it? Good!
